

# From the Director and Board

The Utah County population now has surpassed 500,000. This has increased the need for all public services, and public health is no exception. We have seen significantly increased need for environmental services, school nursing, substance abuse services, and communicable disease control activities among others.

This past year of 2007 was notable for three large communicable disease outbreaks in Utah County. During the spring, we had about 50 cases of campylobacter intestinal infections, all tied to the consumption of raw unpasteurized goat and cow milk from a dairy in Payson. Although raw milk consumption is always high risk for food borne illness, an inspection of the dairy resulted in a number of recommendations which controlled this outbreak.

In early summer, we had 18 cases of Tularemia or "Rabbit Fever" among groups who were attending handcart pioneer camps west of Utah Lake. Information to the camp managers and campers on how to prevent or reduce exposure to biting flies and rabbits controlled this outbreak.

From mid to late summer, we experienced a widespread Cryptosporidiosis outbreak with over 450 confirmed cases in Utah County and over 2,000 statewide. These numbers represent just a small fraction of the total estimated number of people who actually were infected and ill. Cryptosporidiosis is a waterborne intestinal infection which is common from ingesting surface water from lakes and streams, but public swimming pools appeared to be the source for many if not most of the cases in this outbreak. Normal chlorination of recreational pool water is not very effective at removing parasite contamination like Cryptosporidium and Giardia. Besides reminding the public to not swim with diarrhea illness, public pools were asked to close one day week to super chlorinate the pools. These strategies were helpful, but many of the public pools are planning to add ultraviolet light treatment of the recirculating pool water. This kills the parasites more quickly and reduces the risk to swimmers.

The most positive communicable disease issue was seeing the number of human cases of West Nile Virus disease plunge from 65 in 2006 to only 2 in 2007.

Everyone is affected by public health services and concerns every day. We appreciate our County Commission, other local government officials, private businesses, and involved citizens working with our outstanding staff to keep Utah County a healthy place to live.



## Population




### Population Growth (2002 to 2007)

Utah ..... 3.2%











The Division of Environmental Health is comprised of two Bureaus, the Bureau of Air Quality Programs and the Bureau of Environmental Health Services. The Bureau of Air Quality Programs is responsible for the administration of the Utah County Vehicle Emissions Program. The Bureau of Environmental Health Services is responsible for the enforcement of rules governing such things as on-site wastewater systems, food service, public pools and drinking water. The Division of Environmental Health performs a variety of facility inspections and responds to citizen complaints.

## Restaurants per Region




## Cryptosporidium

In 2007, Utah saw the largest recreational water outbreak of cryptosporidium recorded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Utah County saw the first cases in the state. While we led in the number of cases early on, Salt Lake eventually surpassed us. Utah County pools also appeared to have the disease disappear first.

In a typical year, Utah County would see about 3 cases of cryptosporidium. Last year we saw 464 (typically there are 30 cases state-wide, and last year Utah saw nearly 2,000 cases).

# Women, Infants, and Children

WIC, the Special Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children, provides nutritious foods, nutrition education, and breastfeeding counseling to pregnant, post-partum and breastfeeding women, infants, and children up to age five. Eligibility is determined by income level, medical and nutritional need. Services for clients in our county are offered in clinics in Orem, Provo, Payson and American Fork. Services are provided without charge.

## Food Funding Very Tight with Increased Food Costs

Increasing food costs and decreased rebates from the infant formula contract were expected to result in insufficient food funds in 2008. The state WIC program cost containment strategies included eliminating more expensive juices, limiting peanut butter and cheese, and changing to medium sized eggs. Increased federal funding in response to the concerns that clients would need to be taken off the program and the cost cutting strategies implemented should eliminate the need for caseload reductions in this fiscal year.

## WIC Classes

A call came from a client thanking us for the on-line WIC classes. She had been on the WIC website and taken the online class about the importance of iron in your diet. She realized she had the symptoms being described as low iron status. She promptly made an appointment with her physician, who confirmed her findings and implemented iron therapy.

The Division of Community Health Services (Nursing) provides health care services and education for the community with a focus on prevention. The division tracks communicable disease outbreaks, provides screening and immunization services, and oversees school nurses in Utah County.

Utah County faced outbreaks of campylobacter, tularemia, and cryptosporidium in 2007. The campylobacter was associated with the consumption of raw dairy products, especially drinking unpasteurized milk. Tularemia -- or rabbit fever -- occurred in 18 campers on the west side of Utah Lake. The largest break of cryptosporidium recorded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) occurred from recreational waters in Utah. All of these outbreaks were investigated by UCHD epidemiology teams, and included collaborative efforts with the Utah Department of Health, the Utah Department of Agriculture and Food, and the CDC.

## Friends of Public Health

Each year, the UCHD selects one individual and one organization to honor during National Public Health Week as the Utah County "Friends of Public Health". In 2007, **Myla Dutton** and **the Wellness Recovery Clinic** were honored.

Myla has worked with Community Action for 28 years and for most of those years she has been the executive director, heart and soul of this vital agency for our community. Everyone knows Myla as one of our most tireless advocates for people who are lacking the most basic needs of life—food, housing, employment, and health care. Community Action Services and Food Bank is celebrating 40 years in the community. As the second largest food bank in the state of Utah, Community Action serves Utah, Wasatch and Summit counties. Under Myla's direction for the majority of those 40 years, Community Action also provides six other programs that help families in crisis. Myla is a member of numerous community and statewide boards which address these basic needs for people.

In 2004 due to restrictions on the use of surplus Medicaid dollars to treat mental illness in non-Medicaid covered clients, Wasatch Mental Health was forced to discontinue services to over 700 clients in Utah County. To address this crisis the State Legislature appropriated two million dollars of one-time funding statewide to assist community mental health centers. Determined to show the legislature how efficiently they could stretch the dollars appropriated, Wasatch Mental Health began the very innovative Wellness Recovery Clinic, which during fiscal year 2006 served 449 clients.

These clients were all uninsured or underinsured with no alternative access to mental health services. The Wellness Recovery Clinic also uses volunteer mental health professionals and fund-raising efforts to improve and expand services. This clinic has been a model program for all of the state's community mental health centers.



## SPHERE - Pandemic Preparedness






# Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment

The Division of Substance Abuse is the Local Substance Abuse Authority for Utah County and is responsible for prevention, treatment, and early intervention programs for both youth and adults. Substance abuse takes many forms, including abuse of illegal narcotics, abuse of prescription drugs, and the use of alcohol by underage individuals. The Division provides outreach to at risk groups, as well as education materials for prevention of substance abuse.

## Which drinks contain alcohol?

Senate Bill 211 was recently signed by the Governor addressing "Alcopops." Utah



County Division of Substance Abuse Prevention started working on this policy change two years ago around clear labeling of products that contain alcohol and correct classification of so called "Flavored Malt Beverages." These products have bright, flashy packaging and mimic non-alcohol drinks with color and flavors.

## Promise South

In 2007, the Utah County Division of Substance Abuse expanded the Promise Program to open a "Promise South" facility. Promise South is a new treatment program funded with state methamphetamine treatment dollars designed specifically to assist women with children. The program was created as a direct result of the Governor's Meth Task Force. The Utah County Division of Substance Abuse prioritizes women with dependent children as a priority population. Women in drug and alcohol treatment have unique barriers that must be overcome in order to enhance their chances to remain in treatment through completion. These needs include child care, primary health care, transportation, housing, education, and employment. The Promise of Women and Families program is designed to meet these priorities and needs.


# Mosquito Abatement



## 2007 West Nile Virus (WNV) Human Disease by County


