



Why is the Volunteer Care Clinic necessary?

Nearly 11 percent of the 400,000 Utah County residents do not have medical insurance and 12 percent are living below federal poverty standards. Without insurance, the options for quality medical care are limited, and some Utah County residents face the difficult struggle of obtaining basic and essential medical services for their families.



What is the Volunteer Care Clinic?

The Volunteer Care Clinic exists to provide **high-quality medical services** at no cost to low-income, uninsured Utah County residents. The clinic helps alleviate strain on local medical resources for low-income residents while helping families with unmet medical needs, creating connections between community members and providing meaningful service opportunities to local specialists.

Licensed physicians, nurses and other health care providers **donate their time** and resources to the clinic to provide needed health care services. The clinic also houses a volunteer pharmacist and lab technician. All supplies and services are donated to the clinic by generous contributors in the community.

What medical services does the Volunteer Care Clinic provide?

The Volunteer Care Clinic offers **basic health care services**, including pediatric care and general medical care. The clinic also seeks to provide preventative information and educational materials while collaborating with and complimenting existing services and structures. Patients seeking dental care, mental health services or emergency care are referred to specialized community health care providers.



Who qualifies for services?

Utah County residents who are uninsured and living below federal poverty standards are **eligible for services** at the Volunteer Care Clinic. Individuals with government insurance are not eligible for the clinic's services.

The clinic serves dozens of patients per night. No appointment is necessary. Patients are treated on a first come, first serve basis every Tuesday and Thursday from 5 to 7 p.m.



Does the clinic need volunteers or accept donations?

There are **always opportunities available for volunteering** at the clinic. Medical professionals such as physicians, nurses, lab technicians, physician's assistants, nurse practitioners and medical assistants can volunteer to help with patient care. Individuals without medical training are needed as translators and office staff.

Since the clinic is a nonprofit organization, **community donations** are greatly appreciated.

The clinic accepts donations for all kinds of medical supplies, pharmaceutical samples and other health related equipment. Monetary donations are also accepted and very appreciated.
